The Ambition of James and John

In the Gospel passage, James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approach Jesus with the ambitious request to sit at His right and left in glory. While some might view their request as a form of selfish ambition, the intention is not immediately clear. Jesus responds by probing deeper into their readiness to follow His path of suffering, asking if they can drink from His cup of suffering and undergo His baptism of trial. The disciples affirm their willingness, and Jesus acknowledges their courage but reminds them that the final decision belongs to God.

The Path to Glory: Following Jesus' Example

Jesus teaches that the path to being close to Him in glory is not one of privilege or ease but one of sacrifice and service. To be near Jesus requires walking the same difficult path He walked, embracing suffering and giving oneself entirely for others. The message here is not about denying ambition but about aligning one's ambition with the values of service, humility, and love that Jesus exemplified.

Ambition in the Christian Life

Jesus does not condemn the ambition of James and John. In fact, ambition itself is not inherently wrong; it is a natural desire to improve and excel. However, what Jesus emphasizes is the manner and motive behind ambition. Just as it is good for a student to want to excel academically, it is commendable for Christians to aspire to be close to Jesus. But such ambition must be pursued through righteous means—through service, dedication, and love for others, not through selfishness or entitlement.

The Reaction of the Other Disciples

The other disciples are indignant when they hear James and John's request. Their anger reveals a misunderstanding of true greatness in the Kingdom of God. They too are vying for positions of power, perhaps imagining that proximity to Jesus equates to authority or privilege. Jesus seizes this opportunity to clarify that true authority in His Kingdom is rooted in servanthood, not in dominance or control.

Authority as Service

Jesus contrasts the worldly view of authority with the divine perspective. In the world, authority often comes with the notion of being served, but in the Kingdom of God, authority is synonymous with service. Jesus, the ultimate authority, came not to be served but to serve and give His life as a ransom for many. Those who wish to lead in the Kingdom must therefore embody the spirit of service and humility, modeling their lives after Jesus' selfless example.

A Lesson in Humility

Finally, the story of the ambitious frog serves as a metaphor for the dangers of seeking importance for the



wrong reasons. Just as the mother frog's inflated sense of importance led to her destruction, so too can the pursuit of power or status lead to one's downfall if it is not grounded in love, service, and humility. Jesus calls His followers to seek greatness not through self-exaltation but through selfless service, which is the true path to spiritual fulfillment.

The story of the frog and her child teaches a valuable lesson about vanity and the dangers of excessive pride. Here's the fable:

One day, a little frog was hopping around a field and came across a large green ball that belonged to some children who were playing nearby. Amazed by the size of the ball, the young frog hurried back to the pond and excitedly told her mother, "Mom, Mom! I saw a huge toad, much bigger than you!"

The mother frog, filled with vanity and wanting to prove that she was the most important for her child, began to puff herself up. "Was it this big?" she asked, inflating herself even more. The little frog replied, "No, Mom, it was much bigger!"

Determined to outdo the supposed "giant toad," the mother frog kept taking in more and more air, inflating herself further and further. "Was it this big now?" she asked again. But the little frog kept insisting, "No, Mom, much bigger!"

In her eagerness to appear larger and more impressive, the mother frog continued to inflate until, finally, she burst!

Moral:

This fable teaches us that striving for greatness based on ego and vanity can lead to one's downfall. Instead of trying to appear larger or more important than others, it is wiser to embrace humility and accept our true size and limits.

La Ambición de Santiago y Juan

En el pasaje del Evangelio, Santiago y Juan, hijos de Zebedeo, se acercan a Jesús con la ambiciosa petición de sentarse a Su derecha e izquierda en Su gloria. Aunque algunos podrían ver su solicitud como egoísta, su intención no es completamente clara. Jesús responde profundizando en su disposición a seguir Su camino de sufrimiento, preguntándoles si pueden beber de Su cáliz de sufrimiento y recibir Su bautismo de prueba. Los discípulos afirman estar dispuestos, y Jesús reconoce su valentía, pero les recuerda que la decisión final pertenece a Dios.

El Camino a la Gloria: Seguir el Ejemplo de Jesús

Jesús enseña que estar cerca de Él en la gloria no es cuestión de privilegio, sino de sacrificio y servicio. Para estar cerca de Jesús, es necesario recorrer el mismo camino de entrega total y sufrimiento que Él recorrió. El mensaje no rechaza la ambición, sino que la alinea con los valores de servicio, humildad y amor que Jesús encarnó.

Ambición en la Vida Cristiana

Jesús no condena la ambición de Santiago y Juan. De hecho, la ambición no es inherentemente mala; es un deseo natural de mejorar y superarse. No obstante, Jesús enfatiza que la forma en que se persigue esa ambición es lo crucial. Así como es bueno que un estudiante desee sobresalir, también es loable que los cristianos aspiren a estar cerca de Jesús. Pero esa ambición debe perseguirse con justicia, servicio y dedicación, no a través del egoísmo o el deseo de poder.

La Reacción de los Otros Discípulos

Los otros discípulos se indignan al escuchar la petición de Santiago y Juan. Su ira revela una comprensión errónea de lo que significa la verdadera grandeza en el Reino de Dios. Ellos también parecen competir por posiciones de poder, imaginando que estar cerca de Jesús conlleva autoridad o privilegio. Jesús aprovecha esta oportunidad para aclarar que la verdadera autoridad en Su Reino se basa en el servicio, no en el dominio o el control.

La Autoridad como Servicio

Jesús contrasta la visión mundana de la autoridad con la perspectiva divina. En el mundo, la autoridad a menudo está asociada con ser servido, pero en el Reino de Dios, la autoridad es sinónimo de servicio. Jesús, la máxima autoridad, no vino a ser servido, sino a servir y dar Su vida como rescate por muchos. Aquellos que desean liderar en el Reino deben encarnar el espíritu de servicio y humildad, modelando sus vidas según el ejemplo desinteresado de Jesús.

Una Lección de Humildad

Por último, la historia de la rana ambiciosa sirve como metáfora de los peligros de buscar la importancia por las razones equivocadas. Así como el ego inflado de la rana



madre la llevó a su destrucción, buscar el poder o el estatus sin fundamento en el amor, el servicio y la humildad puede llevar a la ruina. Jesús nos llama a buscar la grandeza no a través de la autoexaltación, sino mediante el servicio desinteresado, que es el verdadero camino hacia la plenitud espiritual.

La historia de la rana y su hijo es una metáfora que nos habla sobre los peligros de la vanidad y el orgullo desmedido. Esta breve fábula dice así:

Un día, una pequeña rana saltaba alegremente por el campo y se encontró con una gran pelota verde que pertenecía a unos niños que jugaban cerca. Impresionada por el tamaño de la pelota, la ranita regresó corriendo al estanque y le dijo emocionada a su madre: "¡Mamá, mamá! ¡He visto un sapo grandote, mucho más grande que tú!".

La mamá rana, llena de ego y deseando demostrar que era la más importante para su hijo, comenzó a inflarse. "¿Así de grande?" preguntó, inflándose más y más. La ranita le respondió: "No, mamá, ¡mucho más grande!".

La madre rana, tratando de impresionar a su hijo, tomó más y más aire, inflándose hasta el límite. "¿Así de grande?", volvió a preguntar, aún más inflada. Pero la pequeña rana seguía diciendo: "No, mamá, mucho más grande". La madre, determinada a superar al supuesto "sapo gigante", continuó inflándose hasta que finalmente... ¡se reventó!

Moraleja:

La fábula nos enseña que la búsqueda de grandeza basada en el ego y la vanidad puede llevar a la autodestrucción. En lugar de tratar de parecer más grandes o importantes ante los demás, es mejor ser humildes y aceptar nuestras limitaciones.

Solidarity

In their statement on *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, the Catholic bishops of the United States identify the four main principles of the Church's social teaching and apply them to some concrete issues. This is not to tell the faithful for whom or against whom to vote, but instead to help them form their consciences in accordance with God's truth as they approach this often-challenging decision. The four main principles are the Dignity of the Human Person, the Common Good, Solidarity, and Subsidiarity. They are all interrelated. This bulletin focuses on **Solidarity**, and the other three principles are covered in three other bulletins in this series. —★

Solidarity is “a firm and persevering determination to commit oneself to . . . the good of all and of each individual, because we are all really responsible for all.”¹ We are one human family, whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. The person is social in nature; we develop and flourish within a community. As baptized members of the community of the Church, we are part of one body in Christ and we are also part of one global human family.²

In *Fratelli Tutti (On Fraternity and Social Friendship)* Pope Francis places solidarity at the center of what it means to cultivate social friendship as one family:

*Solidarity means much more than engaging in sporadic acts of generosity. It means thinking and acting in terms of community. It means that the lives of all are prior to the appropriation of goods by a few. It also means combatting the structural causes of poverty, inequality, the lack of work, land, and housing, the denial of social and labor rights.*³

Thus, solidarity affects not only the goals we pursue in public life, but also the way we pursue them—ever mindful that we are all brothers and sisters, all children of God.

Solidarity requires that in our prayer and in our political engagement, those who are weak, vulnerable, and most in need receive preferential concern.

In imitation of the Good Samaritan, we seek to be neighbor to all.⁴ We are called to practice “radical solidarity” by accompanying pregnant women to choose life and by offering support to new mothers and their children.⁵ As neighbors to all, we also advocate for families affected by poverty, unemployment, or illness, individuals struggling with mental illness or addiction, the elderly and those with disabilities, and all whose livelihoods and homes are endangered by climate change.⁶

In countries ravaged by war, such as Ukraine, West Africa, and the Middle East, we must “touch the wounded flesh of the victims” and support efforts for relief and peace,⁷ while also working collaboratively to reduce and eliminate nuclear weapons.⁸

We seek policies that “welcome, protect, promote, and integrate” migrants and refugees who arrive at our borders, and which aid development in countries of origin.⁹

Racism is an obstacle to solidarity, and we strive to root it out not only by examining our hearts individually, but also by looking critically at our policies and institutions.¹⁰

In a culture that overemphasizes the accumulation of wealth, we must not forget our “obligation to ensure that every person lives with dignity and has sufficient opportunities for his or her integral development.”¹¹

As we seek to foster solidarity in hearts and policies, let us pray with Pope Francis in *Fratelli Tutti*:

*Lord, Father of our human family . . . Move us to create healthier societies and a more dignified world, a world without hunger, poverty, violence and war. Amen.*¹²

And it is here that I mostly hear the loneliness, sadness and the hurting. ***I was sick and you looked after me.*** I know that most of the people that I visit in the hospital will be going home. The people living in the various living facilities do have contact with the caretakers at the facility they are living in. And I know that many of the residents do have family visiting them. We have 18 Eucharistic ministers taking Communion to the homebound, nursing homes and the Re-hab Center. Although, we do not know all of the Catholics who are living in these facilities. And so, this is a hint for you if you know someone who has moved into one of our living facilities to let us know so that we can visit with them. It is the homebound to whom I find to be most lonely, to be trapped in their home day after day. It is like being trapped in a prison. ***"I was in prison and you came to visit me."*** I know that there are people you know who are homebound. Someone who is very lonely. Someone who has not been able to receive Eucharist for a long time. All it takes is a phone call to the church office (979-836-4441) to give us their information. Also, nothing is stopping you from visiting someone who is homebound.

Estuve enfermo, y me cuidasteis. Sé que la mayoría de las personas que visito en el hospital se irán a casa. Las personas que viven en los distintos asilos tienen contacto con los cuidadores de las instalaciones en las que viven. Y sé que muchos de los residentes tienen familiares que los visitan. Tenemos 18 ministros eucarísticos que llevan la comunión a los confinados en sus hogares, a los hogares de ancianos y al centro de rehabilitación. Aunque no conocemos a todos los católicos que viven en estas instalaciones, este es un consejo para que, si conoces a alguien que se haya mudado a una de nuestras instalaciones, nos lo hagas saber para que podamos visitarlo. Las personas confinadas


en sus hogares son las que encuentro más solas, atrapadas en su hogar día tras día. Es como estar atrapado en una prisión. "Estuve en prisión y viniste a visitarme". Sé que hay personas que conoces que están confinadas en sus hogares. Alguien que se siente muy solo. Alguien que no ha podido recibir la Eucaristía durante mucho tiempo. Todo lo que se necesita es una llamada telefónica a la oficina de la iglesia (979-836-4441) para darnos su información. Además, nada te impide visitar a alguien que está confinado en su hogar.

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


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
