



Life as a Path

The Gospel recounts the story of a blind man who, although unable to see, perceived more clearly than many others, as he saw with his heart. This blind man was beside the road, living off alms, which serves as a metaphor for those who, while alive, do not enjoy the fullness of life they could have. The initial lesson is that life is like a path upon which we must walk, not linger on the sidelines. Many live on mere scraps rather than fully entering the road of life.

Hearing and Seeing with the Heart

This blind man, despite his physical condition, had an exceptional ability to hear and see beyond what others could perceive. Upon hearing that Jesus was passing by, he called out to Him: "Son of David," a recognition no one else had made. His blindness did not prevent him from seeing the most important thing, as his vision came from the heart. This teaches us that sometimes true vision does not depend on the eyes but on faith and the heart.

Faith in the Face of Obstacles

When he cried out, "Son of David, have mercy on me," the blind man was initially rebuked by some, but instead of being discouraged, he shouted even louder. This illustrates the importance of perseverance in faith, even when faced with obstacles. We must not be swayed by voices seeking to discourage us, nor should we rely solely on those who encourage us, for the true guide must be Jesus. Following Jesus is what

gives meaning to our journey, regardless of the circumstances.

Responding to Jesus' Call

When Jesus called him, the blind man, Bartimaeus, responded with enthusiasm, casting aside his cloak, a symbol of his past life. By throwing off his cloak, he was renouncing his old identity and embracing the new life that awaited him. This gesture represents the transformation that occurs when we allow ourselves to be led by faith in Jesus, who not only grants us physical sight but also spiritual vision, showing us the path we must follow.

The Importance of Having a Clear Goal

The key question that Jesus posed to the blind man, "What do you want me to do?" becomes a personal reflection. If we do not know what we want in life, any path may seem suitable, but without a clear goal, we may lose our way. The blind man knew what he wanted: he wanted to see, and Jesus not only restored his sight but also saved him by giving him purpose. In the end, the blind man followed Jesus along the road, ceasing to be a mere spectator and becoming someone who lives his faith and purpose to the fullest.

La vida como un camino

El evangelio relata la historia de un ciego que, aunque no podía ver, veía mejor que muchos otros, pues percibía con el corazón. Este ciego estaba al lado del camino, viviendo de las limosnas, lo cual es una metáfora de quienes, aunque vivos, no disfrutan de la vida plena que podrían tener. La enseñanza inicial es que nuestra vida es como un camino, en el que debemos caminar y no quedarnos al margen. Muchos viven de las migajas en lugar de adentrarse en el camino de la vida.

Escuchar y ver con el corazón

Este ciego, a pesar de su condición física, tenía una gran capacidad de escuchar y de ver más allá de lo que otros veían. Cuando oyó que Jesús pasaba cerca, lo llamó por su nombre: "Hijo de David", un reconocimiento que nadie más había hecho. Su ceguera no le impedía ver lo más importante, porque su visión provenía del corazón, lo cual nos enseña que a veces la verdadera visión no depende de los ojos, sino de la fe y del corazón.

La fe frente a los obstáculos

Al gritar "Hijo de David, ten compasión de mí", el ciego fue inicialmente reprimido por algunos, pero lejos de desanimarse, gritó más fuerte. Aquí se nos muestra la importancia de perseverar en la fe, incluso cuando encontramos obstáculos. No debemos dejarnos llevar por las voces que buscan desalentarnos, ni depender únicamente de aquellos

que nos animan, porque la verdadera guía debe ser Jesús. Seguir a Jesús es lo que da sentido a nuestro camino, independientemente de las circunstancias.

La respuesta a la llamada de Jesús

Cuando Jesús lo llamó, el ciego Bartimeo respondió con entusiasmo, arrojando su manto, un símbolo de su vida pasada. Al tirar el manto, renunciaba a su antigua identidad y abrazaba la nueva vida que le esperaba. Este gesto representa la transformación que ocurre cuando nos dejamos guiar por la fe en Jesús, quien no solo nos da visión física, sino también espiritual, mostrándonos el rumbo que debemos seguir.

La importancia de tener una meta clara

La pregunta clave que Jesús le hizo al ciego, "¿Qué quieres que haga?", se convierte en una reflexión personal. Si no sabemos qué queremos en la vida, cualquier camino puede parecer adecuado, pero sin una meta clara, podemos perdernos. El ciego sabía lo que quería: quería ver, y Jesús no solo le devolvió la vista, sino que lo salvó al darle propósito. Al final, el ciego siguió a Jesús por el camino, dejando de ser un espectador para convertirse en alguien que vive plenamente su fe y propósito.

Subsidiarity

In their statement on Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, the Catholic bishops of the United States identify the four main principles of the Church's social teaching and apply them to some concrete issues. This is not to tell the faithful for whom or against whom to vote, but instead to help them form their consciences in accordance with God's truth as they approach this often-challenging decision. The four main principles are the Dignity of the Human Person, the Common Good, Solidarity, and Subsidiarity. They are all interrelated. This bulletin focuses on Subsidiarity, and the other three principles are covered in three other bulletins in this series.

The principle of Subsidiarity reminds us that larger institutions in society (such as the state or federal government) should not overwhelm or interfere with smaller or local institutions (such as the family, local schools, or the Church community). Yet larger institutions have essential responsibilities when local institutions cannot adequately protect human dignity, meet human needs, or advance the common good. Subsidiarity reflects the essential freedom and innate human dignity of each person while also recognizing the role higher authorities, such as government, can play to ensure that all people are able to thrive.

Respecting this principle promotes the flourishing of each individual person and the realization of the common good. As Pope Francis has explained, the principle of Subsidiarity "allows everyone to assume his or her own role in the healing and destiny of society." By participating in public life locally, each person and the voluntary associations of civil society to which they belong can be "leaven," bringing "enrichment" to neighbors, to communities, and to society as a whole.³

As we assist the faithful to take up the call to be "leaven" in society, we seek policies that allow individuals and communities to flourish.

 As the bishops teach in Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, "Family—based on marriage between a man and a woman is the first and most fundamental unit

- of society: a sanctuary for the creation and nurturing of children. It should be defended and strengthened, not redefined, undermined, or further distorted."⁴
- It is important to uphold parents' rights and responsibilities to care for their children, including the right to direct their children's education in accordance with their convictions, with support rather than interference from the state.⁵ These include the rights of parents to send their child to the school of their choice, and to protect their child from "gender ideology" at school.
- Moreover, laws, programs, and initiatives should strengthen the social safety net and improve family stability. For example, parents should receive support through work, training, assistance with childcare, healthcare, housing and transportation.⁶ The Earned Income Tax Credit and child tax credits continue to be important vehicles to help low-income families out of poverty.
- The Church's special concern for the poor requires the pursuit of social and economic policies which foster jobs with decent working conditions and just wages, and which support the rights of workers, including the ability to organize and bargain collectively without reprisal.⁷

As we pursue the principle of Subsidiarity in our public policies, we pray for all families and for those in poverty, and we support their efforts to exercise their rights and responsibilities in society.



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DEACON'S CORNER

St. Lucy is the patron of eyesight. Her eyes were taken from her as part of her martyrdom. I saw a painting of St. Lucy and saw that she has eyelids covering her eyes as well as a plate holding her eyes. The captioned explained that she was seeing with God's eyes. Bartimaeus saw with the Lord's eyes even before the Lord healed him. He called out, "Son of David, have mercy on me." He saw with the eyes of faith. His faith resulted in his seeing with his physical eyes. Then, Bartimaeus

followed Jesus. The blind cannot follow someone. Can you imagine the joy that Bartimaeus must have had to be able to follow someone on his own, without being led? But the reading has a deeper level. Those whose souls are blind to the Presence of God cannot follow him. Only those who are willing to take a step of faith, a leap of faith, and seek out the Lord can follow Him. At the conclusion of the long reflection on the healing of the Man Born Blind in the Ninth chapter of the Gospel of John, Jesus says, "I came so that those who are blind may see" So, can you imagine the joy of those whose lives seemed to have no direction, who lived in darkness, when they find a path to life, a light to guide them? Wait a minute. We are those people. We are the ones who had been in darkness and who now have light. "I need direction in life" you may ask. "I don't know what I am doing or why I am doing the things I do." Perhaps, we have all had times that we have felt the same way. Why do we do that? Why do we look for direction, when all that we need is right in front of us? We have been entrusted with a treasure, the very presence of the Lord. When we feel we are lost, then, we need to get back to basics. "You will show me the path to life, abounding joy in your presence, the delights at your right hand forever," the Psalmist proclaims in Psalm 16 vs 11. Jesus has brought profound joy to our lives. He has given us sight. We can see

where we need to go. We can follow Him. We can go to that place where all happiness dwells. Our joy is realizing that like Bartimaeus we are not blind any more. We can

follow the One who gives Light to our lives.

Santa Lucía es la patrona de la vista. Sus ojos le fueron arrebatados como parte de su martirio. Vi una pintura de Santa Lucía y vi que tiene párpados que cubren sus ojos, así como un plato que sostiene sus ojos.



El subtítulo explicaba que ella estaba viendo con los ojos de Dios. Bartimeo vio con los ojos del Señor incluso antes de que el Señor lo sanara. Gritó: "Hijo de David, ten misericordia de mí". Vio con los ojos de la fe. Su fe resultó en que viera con sus ojos físicos. Entonces, Bartimeo siquió a Jesús. Los ciegos no pueden sequir a alquien. ¿Puedes imaginar la alegría que debe haber tenido Bartimeo al poder seguir a alguien por su cuenta, sin ser guiado? Pero la lectura tiene un nivel más profundo. Aquellos cuyas almas están ciegas a la Presencia de Dios no pueden seguirlo. Solo aquellos que están dispuestos a dar un paso de fe, un salto de fe y buscar al Señor pueden seguirlo. Al concluir la larga reflexión sobre la curación del ciego de nacimiento en el capítulo 9 del Evangelio de Juan, Jesús dice: "He venido para que los ciegos puedan ver". Entonces, ¿pueden imaginar la alegría de aquellos cuyas vidas parecían no tener dirección, que vivían en la oscuridad, cuando encuentran un camino hacia la vida, una luz que los quía? Esperen un momento. Nosotros somos esas personas. Somos los que hemos estado en la oscuridad y ahora tenemos luz. "Necesito dirección en la vida", se preguntarán. "No sé lo que estoy haciendo o por qué estoy haciendo las cosas que hago". Tal vez, todos hemos tenido momentos en los que nos hemos sentido de la misma manera. ¿Por qué hacemos eso? ¿Por qué buscamos dirección, cuando todo lo que necesitamos está frente a nosotros? 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
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
